

Lieutenant-Colonel Peter Michael Ross St. Denis was born in Montreal, Quebec. He obtained a diploma in basic, intermediate, and advance policing from the Ontario Police College; throughout his long and distinguished career he has completed over one hundred certificate courses and programs, in both military and law enforcement fields.

In December 2000, he joined The Queen's Own Rifles of Canada (QOR of C). Within QOR of C he has been employed as Operations Officer, Officer Commanding (OC) Parachute Company and 60th Company, the unit's leading line company. A highlight of his time as a Junior Officer was the honour of commanding the Guard of Honour at the official opening of the Juno Beach Center in Normandy, France as well as leading the burial party for three unknown soldiers from the Great War, found in the area of Ypres, Belgium.

Lieutenant-Colonel St. Denis is currently a Professor and Use of Force Coordinator in the Justice, Health, and Wellness Studies Program at Mohawk College of Applied Arts and Sciences located in Hamilton, Ontario. He lives with his wife, Tiffany, who is a decorated Police Officer and currently a member of the regional fraud unit of the Halton Regional Police Service. He has a daughter Nicole and son Matthew.

Through out his term of office he has dedicated himself to ensuring quality standards within the QOR of C. In June of this year he sent a special Honour Guard for the Normandy 70th Anniversary of D-Day. He was the guiding light of new Unit Standing Orders as well as forging many new and exciting links with the Regular Force. He has been a great source of inspiration to the Officers, Sr NCO and members of the regiment. He is especially thankful to all members of the QOR both serving and retired who made his success possible, without their great support achievement would not have been possible.

I won't give away the punch line but suffice it to say that I finally understand why so many fine Canadian soldiers were asked to give their lives in this important clash in WWII.

This had been a diffcult year for the Canadian Forces as the Army must deal with deal with limited funds for the first time in many years, given the Government's increased focus on balancing the federal budget. I suspect that we will need to face similar austerity for a few years and thus we will all be challenged to make sure that we maintain our operational readiness in spite of these restrictions. I have had a number of meetings and attended Conferences

with Reserves 2000 this year and this organization is committed to making sure that the Reserves continue to play an important role in the Canadian Army despite the budget cutbacks. The Prime Minister has clearly stated that he wants to see the Reserves continue to play an important role in our Canadian Army.

There have also been many other individual efforts which must also be recognized such as Capt Adam West who after much work completed a full set of Regimental Standing Orders. This was a monumental project which was executed with great professionalism. I was also very impressed with our open house at Casa Loma this past Fall. The Band received many ovations as they serenaded the visitors from the Great Hall. John Stephens has worked wonders with the Museum and hosted many visitors who loved our exhibits. John, with LCol Rob Zeidler's support, continues to build one of the finest Military Museums in Canada.

I also would like to thank my partner, the Honorary LCol Brendan Caldwell for championing our soldiers, Bob Dunk for his helmsmanship of the National Association, LCol Ed Rayment for his handling of the very challenging role of Regimental Secretary and Adam Hermant for his careful steerage of the Trust fund over many years.

On a final, and very important note, may I draw your attention to the appeal from the Regimental Trust Fund for financial support. The Trust Fund is a critical foundation for this Regiment. It supports many activities and needs that are not funded by the Canadian Army. We need to focus on building this fund up over the next few years. We are very fortunate to have our former Honorary Colonel, Col Paul Hughes, CD as the Chairman of the Trust Fund. He and his wife Bev have been very generous for many years and with his leadership I am confident that we will be able to build a Trust Fund that will support the QOR for decades. No one should feel, however, that their financial support is not worthy. We do need support from any and all quarters, to make this goal happen. We appreciate any support, large or small, that you can provide to the Trust Fund.

Rebecca Leitch is in the second year of the Psychology Program at the University of Waterloo. Her grandfather was Col. H.G. Leitch, a former member of the QOR. Claudine Metcalfe, studying Engineering at Memorial University in Newfoundland, is the granddaughter of John Metcalfe, President, Newfoundland and Maritimes Branch. Hannah Hryhoryshen, enrolled in the Nursing Program at Camosun College in Victoria, BC, is the granddaughter of Vancouver Island QOR Association member Gord Hryhoryshen. Her parents are also currently serving in the Primary Reserves.

An urgent message to the Regimental Family of The Queen's Own Rifles of Canada

In my first report to you in 2014 I'd like to take the opportunity to ask for help from the members of the regimental family. There are times when it is necessary to address the facts of life and to outline the situation in plan terms. This is one of those times. The Queen's Own Rifles of Canada's Regimental Trust Fund is at a critical stage, with the need for funds being maintained at a consistent level while the income from donations has been steadily decreasing, year over year.

This requires fiscal belt-tightening, with the first obvious result being noticed in this issue of Rifleman, which has been reduced in size from its standard 48 pages in length to a lesser number, with paid advertising being included for the first time in many years. The decision has also been taken to cease printed publication of the Powder Horn, which typically was produced three times each year. Other efficiencies are underway.

The activities undertaken on your behalf by the Regimental Trust ensure that our regiment is supported in areas not funded by the Department of National Defence. This has been the case since it was created in 1959 with the aim of "establishing a fund to promote the efficiency, welfare and well-being of the Regiment and of its members and to appoint Trustees to raise, hold and administer such fund". Subsequently, the Trust was registered with the Government of Canada as a charitable organization and as such received tax exempt status.

Since its inception the Trust has relied entirely on general fundraising appeals to generate the funds necessary to underwrite the costs of those responsibilities which do not receive government financial support, but which we feel are critical to the regiment's well-being. In this way we endeavour to build upon the regiment's more than 150-year-history by funding activities which raise its profile in the community for the benefit of its serving members, as well as those in the regimental family.

In addition to general appeals made in direct mail campaigns and in the pages of the regimental publications as well as on the website at qor.com, funds are generated through various foundation grants as well as designated donations for special regimental projects. Currently, the vast majority of funds received are from foundation grants and designated donations (88%) as opposed to general receipts received as a result of our appeals (12%).

Unfortunately, the aging population of the regimental family has resulted in a steep decline in contributions from that source in recent years as members pass on. However, in each fundraising appeal we encourage donors to think of remembering us in their wills so that their support for the regiment can continue in their names.

Because of the variety of demands made upon its resources on an annual basis, the Trust has disbursed all, or almost all of the monies collected each year. The following outlines where the money goes, although the Trust is always open to requests for financial support or worthy projects, each one of which is given full consideration.

The Regiment. For items and material not supplied by DND, such as the Post-Deployment Support Group's efforts in supporting the more than 75 Queen's Own personnel who deployed to Afghanistan, comforts to Riflemen deployed in theatre, Regimental and Band uniforms and instruments, travel and accommodation for D-Day and VE-Day tours, out-of-province or out-of-country military events and sports teams.

Regimental Museum: Rental space for the Regimental Museum at Casa Loma, additions to Queen's Own-related artefacts, support for events and maintenance.

Monuments and Memorials: Upkeep of those which now exist as well as necessary replacement, as done for the aging markers for those killed in the Fenian Raid in 1866.

RHQ HQ: Responsible for the writing, design and production and printing of the Rifleman. qor.com web site, writing an update to the Regimental history for completion this year, writing of the 2009 book about the history of the regimental bands since 1860, as well as liaison with regimental associations and those of our allied regiments.

Vision

My own personal vision is to create a capital fund within the Trust to generate interest on an annual basis. This will have the advantage of our not being so dependent on the vagaries and uncertainties of annual campaigns and contributions. I have no doubt that this will take some time and a lot of work on behalf of the Trustees but in my view it is imperative if we are to be In Pace Paratus for the next 150 years.

In Closing

The foregoing gives you a "broad-strokes" outline of what your Regimental Trust does for the Regiment and as time passes, and with the help of the committee leads whose responsibility it is to ensure that the projects currently in place are carried out I hope to bring you occasional updates. Without their assistance and devotion these projects would surely founder. Looking ahead, I expect we will be seeing proposals for new ventures for the Trust Fund to support and it is my sincere hope that funding will be sufficient to ensure at least some of these can be carried to completion.

I urge you to forward a tax-deductible donation to the Regimental Trust Fund to aid in carrying out its pledge to support our Regiment in every way possible. Elsewhere in this issue of Rifleman you will find details on how to do this, along with a donation form information on where to forward your contribution. I also offer my sincere thanks to thanks to all of those of you who respond to this urgent plea.

Currently, proud members of the Regiment extra-regimentally employed (ERE) at CFB Trenton are actively supporting two units: the Canadian Army Advanced Warfare Centre (previously known as the Canadian Forces Land Advanced Warfare Centre) and 8 Wing Operations.

There are six QOR of C members ERE at CFB Trenton; four employed at the Canadian Army Advanced Warfare Centre (CAAWC), one employed as a civilian on base and one at 8 Wing Operations. Within CAAWC, Capt Ben Lee is employed as the Officer Commanding Parachute Training Company; Sgt Jason Bridge is an Arctic Operations Advisor (AOA) instructor; Sgt Craig Buckle is the Unit Embarkation Officer; and Sgt Jason Chin-Leung is employed as a Parachute Instructor. Co-located at CAAWC, Sgt Dmitri Frounze is also employed at CFB Trenton as a civilian, providing technical advice to the Combat Training Centre in Gagetown, NB and CAAWC.

Lastly, Sgt Brian Ragos works in 8 Wing Operations within the Combat Aerial Delivery Support Section. All members are still supporting the Regiment despite being ERE; most evident was support to the Basic Parachutist (B Para) courses run by the Regiment.

Currently, Capt Lee and Sgt Chin- Leung are forward deployed to Perris, California for the Military Freefall Parachutist and Military Freefall Jumpmaster J-stage. Capt Lee is the Airborne Force Commander and Sgt-Chin-Leung is the Course Warrant Officer for the Military Freefall Jumpmaster course. Sgt Bridge also forward deployed but with the AOA course in Yellowknife, NT. Sgt Chin-Leung has been employed with CAAWC since 2004 and has represented the Regiment well and is one of the most knowledgeable Parachute Instructors (PI) working at CAAWC. Sgt Bridge has been employed with CAAWC since 2008 and is still actively involved in Regimental life and events. He has instructed on Helicopter Insertion Instructor courses, Aerial Delivery, DZ/LZ controller, and several round canopy courses to include the two B Para courses run

by QOR of C in 2012 and 2013 respectively. Capt Lee has been employed at CAAWC since July 2013 as the Officer Commanding Parachute Training Company (PTC). He is the first PRes officer to occupy the OC position at the school in its history. PTC is responsible for all pers para courses; the Canadian Armed Forces Parachute Team, known as the Skyhawks, also falls under PTC. Since his arrival to the school, Capt Lee has been busy overseeing the conduct of the various parachute courses run by the company. Sgt Ragos has been at CFB Trenton for many years and worked at CAAWC until recently. Now employed at 8 Wing Operations - Combat Aerial Delivery Support Section, Specifically, Sgt Ragos is intimately involved with the MAJAID support loads; equipment that is a critical operational requirement in the event of an emergency.

Sgt Frounze, despite being employed at CFB Trenton as a civilian, is still involved in unit activity, in particular para training. For the next few years, the Regiment will maintain a presence at CFB Trenton and be on the forefront in the CAF parachuting capability. Airborne!

Through the generous financial support provided by long time QOR member and strong supporter, Lionel Goffart, the dream became a reality and they left on June 3. The first stop was the town of Anisy home of the QOR at last light on D-Day. The first parade occurred at Le Mesnil Patry on June 5, site of the QOR Battle of June 11 1944. The Guard was active at our June 6/44 objective plus they had the opportunity of personally meeting our Colonel in Chief along with Mrs Harper wife of our PM. The group also toured the key battle areas in vintage military trucks. The balance of the time was then spent at Ypres - the Menin Gate, the Somme at Beaumont Hamel and at our famed Vimy Monument. 
100th Anniversary of the Battle of Vimy Ridge, April 2017:

His service in Afghanistan includes duties with Combined-Joint Task Force 6 as Operational Plans Officer for Kandahar City and Chief of Governance Branch at 6th (UK) Division, HQ Regional Command (South), for which he was awarded the Canadian Expeditionary Forces Command Commendation and the Division Commander's Commendation.

In civilian life, LCol Banerjee is the Chief Operating Officer of Hidi Rae Consulting Engineers, a multi-national, multi-disciplinary firm headquartered in Toronto.

Extra Regimentally, LCol Banerjee has worked for the Canadian Defence Academy, the CF Recruiting, Education and Training Systems Command and on two domestic response operations with 2 Canadian Mechanized Brigade Group. He is a graduate of Marine Corps University (Virginia), the Peace Support Training Centre (Kingston), the CF School of Management (St Jean), the UN Staff & Operations Officer Programmes (Slovenia and Geneva), The NATO School (Oberammergau), the African Centre for Conflict Resolution (Kenya), the Canadian Land Command & Staff College (Kingston) and the Canadian Forces College (Toronto). 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

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An Autobiography of a Canadian Military Leader

Lieutanant Colonel Thorold "Boom" Marsaw, CD, tells the story of his life as a soldier, rising from the ranks of the Army Cadets to be given command of First Battalion The Queen's Own Rifles of Canada, in which he had served since graduation as a teenager from the Canadian Army's Officer Candidate School.

This is not just another "war story." Rather, it is a sensitive, in-depth account of a professional soldier's career as he shares his innermost thoughts and personal life stories of being one of Canada's peacekeepers and military leaders.

Intensive training, war games, the Korean War and service, principally on peackekeeping duties, in Korea, Germany, Norway, India, Pakistan,

Cyprus, as well as being stationed in Canada, were all part of his life as a soldier. He achieved a lifelong dream by being named to command the 1st Battalion, a bittersweet experience as he took the salute on the occasion of the regiment's 110th birthday in 1970, only to relinquish command the next day as a result of government cutbacks which removed his Queen's Own battalion from the Canadian Army's Order of Battle and re-introduced it as 3rd Battalion, Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry. Six years later, after 25 years as a soldier, LCol Marsaw retired from the military and turned to the ministry, where he began a new career.

The Queen's Own Rifles of Canada Trust Fund

Dear Riflemen and Friends of the Regiment:

For many years you have participated and supported your Regiment financially. It is through these donations that the Commanding Officer and elements of our Regimental family have been able to fund things that DND does not fund. Without your annual financial support many of the things that we take for granted may or even will not be funded. Firstly, The Trust operates on a cash in, cash out basis. In other words we do not have a pot of gold at the end of the rainbow. In fact, a myth exists within the Regimental family that the Trust does indeed have a pot of gold that it can draw on to fund its activities. This myth has no basis in fact. There is no large pool of funds that the Trust can draw upon to fund its operations. The basic costs for the Trust for Museum rent and up-keep, the needs of the serving Battalion, the web site, the Rifleman, insurance, fund-raising etc. are between \$35,000 and \$50,000 per year and these funds are obtained from annual donations. The "special needs" identified by the Regiment are funded by separate campaigns, targeted fundraising or appeals. Examples of these are the fund raising for the 150th birthday in 2010, PDSG (Post Deployment Support Group), the publishing of a book related to the past 50+years and the planned unit trip to Normandy for D+70 in June 2014. Without selected and special targeted fundraising these activities would not be possible. So, yes, the Trust Fund relies on generous donations from members of the Regimental Family and Friends of the Regiment to operate every year. Without your continuing support we would have great difficulty meeting our annual goals/objectives.

Please read below for a greater understanding of your Trust Fund:

Background

The Queen's Own Rifles of Canada Trust Fund came into being on September1st 1959 when an Agreement and Declaration of Trust was made between the Colonel of the Regiment, Col. Baptist Johnson, OBE VD , and seven Trustees. The original seven Trustees were Lt. Col. the Honorable Ian M. MacDonell MBE VD , Col. JGK Strathy OBE ED , Lt. John G. Cream, Lt. Col. N. Charles Bradshaw, Lt. Col. Roland A. Harris OBE , and Maj. Edward A. Dunlop OBE GM. The purpose of the trust were generally described as being "to establish funds for the efficiency, welfare and well-being of the regiment and to appoint trustees to raise, hold and administer such funds". Since the Trust was established the Declaration of Trust has been updated twice with the most recent update on June 9th 2008. The updates clarified the purposes of the trust and roles and responsibilities of the trustees. In 1967 the Trust Fund was registered with the tax authorities, now the Canada Revenue Agency, as a charity and has the ability to issue tax receipts for qualifying donations.

Purpose of the Trust

The updated purposes of the Trust continue to maintain the original intent and have been expanded and clarified to include the following major items:

- 1. supplying uniforms, accoutrements and equipment to the serving units, band and Pioneers and Skirmishers of the Regiment;
- 2. sending soldier's comforts to members of the regiment who are deployed on duty;
- 3. maintaining and operating a regimental headquarters;
- 4. celebration of regimental birthdays and anniversaries;
- 5. publication of Regimental newsletters, journals and website;
- 6. publishing Regimental histories;
- 7. establishment and maintenance of the Regimental Museum;
- 8. support for Regimentally affiliated Cadet Corps; and
- 9. establishment and maintenance of Regimental monuments, memorials and graves.

Governance of the Trust

The Trust Declaration allows for 15 voting trustees and at the present time there are 14. A minimum of three trustees must have held the rank of Captain or higher and at least 80% of the trustees must have served in the Regiment. All trustees must be either members of the Association or associate members of the Officer's Mess. There are also ex-officio trustees who may attend all meetings but cannot vote. They are the Honorary Colonel, the Honorary Lieutenant Colonel, the Commanding Officer(s) of the serving Battalion(s), and the President of the National Association. The trustees meet twice a year - usually June and December. At the meetings the President presents a report, budgets and finances are reviewed and approved, appointments for trustees made and reports received from committees, the Commanding Officer, the National Association and the Museum, and other business is dealt with. The Executive Committee also holds meetings as required during the year to deal with items as they arise. At the present time the officers of the Trust are:


