Remarkable Achievement...Captain Eileen Vaughan, who served with the Battalion in Toronto until her appointment as Personal Assistant to Major General N.M. Hall, Commander of Land Forces, Central Area, was named the 1990 Canadian Forces Female Athlete of the Year. With 4,025 free fall jumps to her credit, Eileen is the most experienced Canadian female parachutist. She is now living in Halifax, N.S.

The Column of Freedom

Readers of "The Powder Horn" may be interested to know that an all-Canadian project, born from an unheralded sense of patriotism, is underway. A life-size, bronze monument dubbed "The Column of Freedom" will be erected on Toronto's University Avenue in front of the Royal Canadian Military Institute. A project of principles, "The Column of Freedom" pays tribute to Canada's contemporary Forces, as well as honouring the 100 year history of pride in our military embodied in the celebrated Centenary of the Royal Canadian Military Institute.

The Column of Freedom Monument Association was formed to fund this project. Two of the Association's leading directors are BGen Don Pryer and Lt W.R.C. Houston, well-known riflemen.

One of the highlights of this project is the unique and innovative approach taken towards its construction. The monument will be created on the grounds of Canadian Forces Staff School in Toronto. The artist, RCMI member Sandra J. Shaw, has collaborated with Capt Alec Shipman of the Royal Canadian Signals Cadets to provide an exciting educational experience for the Cadets. They will receive instruction on sculpture and casting by the lost-wax method.

Regiment Loses Two of Its Finest Officers

This year the Regiment has lost two of its senior officers who served Canada and the military with great distinction.

Lieutenant Colonel Stephen MacLeod Lett, DSO died on January 18th in his 82nd year. He was second-in-command of the 1st Battalion which took part in the Normandy landings. As part

of the Canadian 3rd Division, 1st Battalion made the deepest penetration into enemy territory of all Allied units.

Colonel Lett was appointed commanding officer of the Battalion in September 1944 and led the Battalion in heavy fighting until the end of World War II. He was awarded the Distinguished Service Order for bravery.

A memorial service for Colonel Lett was held in St. Paul's Anglican Church in Toronto at which tributes were offered by Colonel J.F. Lake, Mr. Lloyd Price and Mr. Tristan Lett.

Lieutenant Colonel William Thomas Barnard, ED, CD, died on March 7th in his 95th year. A veteran of two world wars, Colonel Barnard commanded the Toronto Battalion from May 1947 to May 1951. He was the author of the Regimental History book "The Queen's Own Rifles 1860-1960, One Hundred Years of Canada" and for many years was the curator of the Regimental Museum in Casa Loma.

The funeral service at the Trull Funeral Home was attended by members of his family, former and serving members of the Regiment, and friends.
