The Errington Platoon

Lawrence A. Cornett, son of the

late Sgt Tony Cornett, writes to say that he is engaged in full-time research with the aim of publishing a book on the "Errington Platoon".

This platoon was formed in June 1940 from a group of mostly miners from Geraldton area gold mines who volunteered for military service under command of Sgt I.R.F. Wilson of The Queen's Own Rifles of Canada. They travelled to Toronto by special coach provided by the mine owners. Between June 1940 and June 1944 the majority of these men ended up in 7 Platoon, A Company.

Today, surviving members of the platoon live in communities spread from B.C. to Nova Scotia. Born out of a determination to make the 125th anniversary of

the birth of Canada a truly memorable occasion while also keeping in mind the Regiment's 132nd birthday, Sgt Bob Ducharme organized a very special day for members of the Nanaimo Association.

Joining with the 61st Korean Veterans Association under Maj Pat Paterson, the two bodies assembled for a commemorative church parade at which the guest speaker was LCol Thorold (Boom) Marsaw, former Commanding Officer of the 1st Battalion, and now a Pastor with the Fellowship Baptist Churches. His message was entitled, "There is something about a soldier". It highlighted the biblical record of the response of the soldier to the call of Christ.

Following a brief reception for those in attendance, the veterans moved to join in the city's annual parade marking the reign of Queen Victoria. Nanaimo, which boasts the longest unbroken string of such celebrations in the Commonwealth, did things up royally.

After reviewing the parade, Mayor Joy Leach proceeded to the cenotaph where the presentation of a commemorative plaque was made to her and the citizens of the city by LCol Marsaw.

In making the presentation, LCol Marsaw gave a brief historical sketch of events leading to the Korean conflict and an insight into the spirit of the men who fought in that United Nations campaign.

At a reception in the Officers' Mess, Captain E.R.C. Simundson, PMC, received from Mrs. Audrey Lett a sterling silver cigarette case which had been presented to her late husband, LCol S.M. Lett, by Her Majesty Queen Mary in 1945 soon after the end of World War II. □
