A resident of Bracebridge since retirement from the Canadian Forces, General MacKenzie has his eyes set on winning the nomination and a seat in the House of Commons in the upcoming federal election.

Regimental Historian.

Cosens Remembered.

At the annual Aubrey Cosens dinner held in the Sergeants' Mess on 26 February 1997, Commissionaire Robert Connery, a World War II Royal Canadian Navy veteran, presented the Regiment with a framed set of Sergeant Aubrey Cosens' medals including the rare George VI Mother's Cross.

Commissionaire Connery, who served with Robert Hampton Gray, Canada's last recipient of the Victoria Cross, made the gift in honour of his son Wayne who served with the Queen's Own Rifles from 1966 to 1970. Wayne was seriously wounded while serving in Cyprus in an incident that saw the death of another rifleman.

The medals are to hang in Regimental lines beside a photograph of Sergeant Cosens. It will serve as a constant reminder of the sacrifices made by those who served in the Regiment before us.

Ceremonial Guard Commander.

Retired Lieutenant Colonel B.G. (Grahame) Baskerville, the Powder Horn's roving reporter in the Ottawa area, reports that on

25 August 1996, at a ceremonial parade on the grounds of Rideau Hall in Ottawa, Major C.P. (Pat) Dillon assumed command of the Ceremonial Guard. The Ceremonial Guard is composed of a company from each of The Governor General's Foot Guards (GGFG) and The Canadian Grenadier Guards (CGG). The Trooping of the Colours and Change of Command Parade was held in the presence of His Excellency the Governor General of Canada, the Honorable Romeo Leblanc.

Major Dillon was commissioned in The Queen's Own Rifles of Canada in 1965 and was assigned to the 2nd Battalion in Calgary. On disbandment of the 2nd Battalion in 1968 he was transferred to the Princess Patricia's Canadian Light Infantry (PPCLI). Later, from 1982 to 1984, he served as the Commanding Officer of 2 Airborne Commando, The Canadian Airborne Regiment.

Major Dillon is a graduate of the United States Marine Corps Command and Staff College in Quantico, Virginia. He has served in Germany and his tours of duty have included peacekeeping tours in Cyprus, Vietnam, Egypt, Israel and Syria. He currently resides in Oxford Station, Ontario.

Regimental Birthday Celebrations.

The Regimental Birthday celebrations in Toronto will be limited to functions in each of the Messes in Moss Park Armoury this year. A Committee has been formed to study the feasibility of staging Regimental Birthday celebrations on a cycle that will be more meaningful to serving members and veterans. Donations from members of the Regimental family, corporations and friends of the Regiment reached a total of \$32,588.

Approved expenditures amounted to \$32,913 for the financial support of the following Regimental activities.

THE REGIMENT THIRTY YEARS AGO

1967, Canada's Centennial Year, was an exciting, busy and rewarding year for every component of The Queen's Own Rifles of Canada.

The Regimental Depot commanded by Major J.L. McCulloch was stationed in Currie Barracks in Calgary. During the year it trained 245 recruits for the 1st and 2nd Battalions and graduated 44 riflemen in advanced infantry skills. A QOR of C display for the Alberta Provincial Centennial Caravan went on tour under the watchful eye of Major Paul Zmean. The display consisted of twelve glass-enclosed display cases highlighting the Regiment's history from its founding in 1860. As part of the Calgary Stampede's Centennial Year theme, the Depot set up "Camp Vimy Ridge" which featured a World War I trench system in minute detail. Captain Joe Schmitz, the Museum Curator, assisted the Depot in developing and executing both displays.

The 1st Battalion under command of Lieutenant Colonel Herb Pitts was stationed in Work Point Barracks, Esquimalt, B.C. The Battalion was tasked to be a component of Allied Command Europe, Mobile Force (Land) which, in addition to its normal training commitments and participation in Canada's Centennial activities, occupied the bulk of its time and energy during the year.

At the beginning of the year, the 2nd Battalion under command of Lieutenant Colonel Neville (Robbie) Robinson was at the Home Station in Calgary but by mid-April it found itself in Cyprus in a peacekeeping role. The Battalion distinguished itself in all phases of its six month tour of duty returning to Calgary in October.

The 3rd Battalion under command of Lieutenant Colonel F.P.J. (Frank) Mulrooney spent its first full year in Moss Park Armoury. The Battalion busied itself in meeting the standards required for its role in National Survival Emergency Operations, in Internal Security Operations and in support of the Regular Force.

The highlight of 1967 undoubtedly was the visit to Canada by the Regiment's Colonel-in-Chief, Her Royal Highness Princess Alexandra, accompanied by her husband, the Honourable Angus Ogilvy. During her stay in Canada, Her Royal Highness paid visits to the 3rd Battalion (14-17 May), the 1st Battalion (18-21 May) and the Regimental Depot (24-25 May).

The Colonel of the Regiment, Colonel J.G.K. Strathy, and Mrs. Strathy, were able to accompany the Royal Party on its visits to the units of the Regiment.

In July, Colonel J.G.K. Strathy made a brief visit to the 2nd Battalion in Cyprus where he was warmly greeted by Colonel H.C.F. Elliot, the Canadian Contingent Commander and Lieutenant Colonel N.A. Robinson, the Commanding Officer of the 2nd Battalion. On return to Canada, Colonel Strathy summed up his visit to Cyprus with the following words, "This Cyprus trip undoubtedly will remain one of the most memorable events of my appointment as Colonel of the Regiment. It demonstrated the high degree of efficiency, the excellent morale and the fine leadership which exists in the Regular units of our Regiment."
