




Dear Jir: It is with a great deal of pleasure that I am able to inform you that at long last The Queen's Own Alfles of Genada have been mobilised for overseas duty in the Canadian Active Service Force. The Regiment was very disappointed last September to learn that they were not to be mobilized for overseas duty and only after a long period of waiting was it discovered that those in authority had selected us for a very important duty, the necessity for which disappeared due to an International situation which arose in late August and early September. This duty would have taken the Regiment away from Toronto in the opposite direction to which this letter will travel. Canada's war effort was originally limited to the provision of two Divisions and we were, for the reasons sketched above, not included in these two Divisions. You can imagine the heart-burns of all ranks of the Regiment when they discovered that no Active Service employment was in prospect, and that the only thing for us to do was to continue our weekly training. On top of this, it was considered necessary to deprive us of our uniforms and most of our training equipment. I think you will agree

that the carrying on of training in civilian clothes some six hundred or seven hundred strong in spite of activate conditions mentioned above was table very credible.

Our Government decided to increase Canada's contribution to four Divisions and on the 3rd of June we received official mobilizing orders.

Within a week of the actual commencement of recruiting we were up to war strength and are now carrying out individual preliminary training at local headquarters, the men being on subsistence allowance and living at home. We expect to move into camp very shortly. components

We are anxious that all units of our allied Regiments should know of our position and with this end in view this letter has been written. Copies will be enclosed for distribution at your discretion.

On behalf of the Canadian active Service Force Battalion of The Queen's Own Rifles, I wish to express . to all units of our allied Regiments, our delight at the prospect of taking our stand with them in the battle line. on active service with them.
