OPERATION "PLUNDER"

(Phase 4)

21 April 45

The war in Europe was fast becoming a debacle for the doomed German Armies. On three sides the allies were attacking successfully and relentlessly.

On the Russian Front the great drive for BERLIE had begun and already some of the Eastern suburbs were in Russian hands. In Italy, BOLOGHA had been captured and 5th and 8th Army columns were smashing forward into the plains of Northern Italy, threatening the rear door of the German fortress "Redoubt" itself.

In the West the First French Army had reached the Swiss frontier West of Lake Constance. The 7th US army driving 40 miles Southeast from NUREMBURG had already established a bridgehead over the Upper Danube. The 3rd US army were fighting in CZECHOSLOVAKIA and the 1st US armyhad cleared LEIPSIG. The RUHR valley was completely mopped up and over 200,000 prisoners taken. The Br 2nd army were on the ELBE far to the North of the American bridgehead at MAGDEBURG, and BREMEN on their left flank was falling rapidly. Complete victory was not far distant.

The plan for the 2nd Cdn Corps now was the clearing of the Peninsula which included EMDEN, OLDENBURG and WILHELMSHAVEN.

It was to this area that this Bn set out at 0900 hrs on 21 April after a two days rest in a rear area. North and East from HEERENVEEN through LEEUWARDEN, GRONINGEN AND WINSCHOTEN, the convoy moved to fineally halt at 1800 hrs in the village of RHEDE (682964: sheet GRONINGEN EAST; Central Europe: 1/100,000) approx 20 miles South of EMDEN. Here we took up tactical positions, relieving a unit of the Polish Division. Forward of us was the NSR.

3 Cdn Divs responsibility was for the operation in the EMDEN area. On the far right the 2nd and 4th Cdn Divs were responsible for the OLDENBURG area. In the centre the Polish Div was to clear into the WILHELMSHAVEN area.

The plan for 3 Cdn Div was briefly, to clear North on theleft of the EMS river and then to force a crossing either in the vicinity of EMDEN or further South in the vicinity of LEER(810150: sheet OLDENBURG; Central Europe; 1/100,000). 7 and 8 Cdn Inf Bdes were to attack with 7 on the left and 8 on the right on the line of the river. 9 Bde in reserve was to make the river crossing.

22 April 45

After a quiet night and the morning spent in preparation for the initial attack, the En marched from RHEDE late in the afternoon to assemble in BRUAL (695008).

Dog Coy led the Bn from BRUAL at 2000 hrs to DIELE(718033) and under cover of darkness at 2200hrs began the attack out of the NSR position. Thrusting to the outskirts of STAPELMOOR (723047) against no opposition they were consolidating by 2230 hrs when Baker Coy passed through them to clear the town itself. Here again there was no opposition.

At 2330 hrs Charlie Coy passed through to take the crossroads beyond the town. Although no enemy were encountered, shellfire began to harass

23 April 48

Following closely behind Charlie Coy, Able Coy at 0030 hrs passed through to push on to the bldg area around the 719060, North and Northeast of the crossroads. The lead platoon was subjected to fire from two automatic rifles as they neared the final objective but as the advance continued the enemy fled, leaving their weapons. While the coy consolidated, enemy shellfire began to bracket their position but no casualties were suffered.

At 0230 hrs Charlie again moved up to attack, their objective being HOLTHUSEN (719062). Against slight opposition the coy had completely cleared the area by 0530 hrs with only one casualty. Five of the enemy were killed.

With the coming of daylight Dog Coy moved up to attack the last objective, the "Y" road (734068) before WERNER (7408). SA fire from the right flank harassed the advance. Halfway to the objective an MG opened fire from the open field s to the right. Two secs of 18 platoon gave covering fire as the other section, in a fast frontal assault, stormed the post and took five prisoners. By 0900 hrs the objective was gleared and the position firm. One casualty had been suffered.

While the MSR now moved beyond to clear WEENER and the R de C advanced on theleft toward BUNDE (690100) this Bn remained in these positions till 2100 hrs that night. At that time the Bn moved up to the R de C area to concentrate in a village (711094) between BUNDE end WEENER.

24 April 45

For the next day a Bn flanking attack on the approaches to the EMS river opposite LEER was planned. Due to the extensive cratering however this plan was altered. Our attack continued straight North into the RHIEDERLAND Peninsula.

At 0730 hrs in the morning Charlie Coy pushed forward from the concentration area to ST GEORGE WOLD (723140) and the road junction beyond (723145). Against only slight opposition the coy had attained its objective by 1100 hrs with one casualty. One of the enemy was wounded and five others were taken prisoner. Shortly after this the area began to flood due to enemy action. At 2000 hrs the coy was withdrawn into the Bn Assembly area on the road between BUNDE and BUNDER (710140) behind the R de C .

25 April 45

At midnight Charlie Coy was again committed to the attack. Moving Northward through BUNDER, their responsibility was the approaches to DITZUMER VERLAAT (686183) and the road junction (694166) before the town. Against SA fire and one Bazooka the coy took the objective without loss. Two of the enemy were killed.

At 0200 hrs Baker Coy pushed on from Charlie Coy's firm base to clear up the road to the outskirts of the town. Again anly weak resistance was offered by the confused chamy.

At 0600 hrs Able Coy was committed. Their objectives were the bridge in the town and the road junction at 682185. Shellfire began to fall heavily on all the coy areas and on the attacking troops. For Able Coy's loss of three casualties, eight prisoners were taken.

Immediately following Able Coy's success Dog Coy pushed through to clear the remainder of the town and the Northern outskirts. Seven casulties were suffered from shellfire but no enemy were encountered. They were consolidated by 0800 hrs.

While thiw had been taking place at 0730 hrs a group of the enemy were observed forming up for an attack on the right of Charlie Coy. Before any assault could materialise however, Charlie Cey took effective counter action. 25 casualtied were inflicted and five others taken prisoner. Charlie Cey suffered no casualties in this action, but shortly after two casualties were suffered under a severe concentration of shellfire.

Beyond DITZUMER VERLAAT the road over a small stream had been destroyed by the enemy. In the afternoon at approx 1430 hrs Able Coy pushed from the town to establish a bridgehead. There was no opposition.

At 1700 hrs Dog Coy moved up through Able up the road to taker up position near DYESTERHUSEN and propare to clear through, with Charlie and Baker Coys, to the South bank of the river facing EMDEN. On the right POGUM was Baker Coys objective. On theleft DITZUM was Deg Coy's objective, with support from Charlie Coy.

Baker Coy, committed at 1730 hrs. was forced to withdraw because of resistance and rising water on the Southern approaches of POGUM.

Dog and Charlie Coys were also withdrawn and a Bn "O" Gp was held.

27 April 45

Under a different plan of attack Dog Coy at 0100 hrs in the morning was committed first to take DITZUM.

The lead sec was split up in the darkness and the Sec Comd found himself alone when he heard a challenge from German sentries. In the face of two Schmeisser automatics he raised his pistol and demanded surrender. The two sentries promptly threw down their weapons. On being asked if there were more of their comrades in the house they declared that there were only civilians. The Sjt entered and brought out the "civilians"—15 of them, complete with steal helmets, uniforms and kit.

This was typical of the epposition in the town, and Baker Coy passing through to take POGUM from the flank, found the same situation. Approx 500 prisoners were taken during the action.

With this the enemy had all been cleared from the RHEIDERLAND Peninsula and thee Bn moved back to a rest area near BUNDE.

Here we remained for three days while the 9th Bde forced a crossing of the EMS river at LEER and 7 Bde followed through to strike North and Northeast from the bridgehead.

The Div Plan new was to attack and capture AURICH(8241: sheet WILHELMSHAVEN; Central Europe: 1/100,000), key road centre, and then to strike West into EMBEN and Northwest to the North Sea coast.

7 Bds, breaking out of the bridgehead were to form a SL for 8 Bds to clear the approaches to AURICH. Then 7 Bds again was to pass through to clear AURICH itself, and in conjunction with 9 Bds to secure a SL for 8 Bds's assault on EMDEN itself.

2 May 45

At 0900 hrs in the morning the Bn proceeded by convot from the BUNDE area to cross the river at LEER and roll Northeast to a concentration area in HESEL(905235). Here the Bn delivered at approx 1130 hrs to take up a non-tactical position in the town for the rest of the day and night.

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3 May 45

In the morning at 0830 hrs the Bn moved off from MBSEL northward to BAGBAND (915285), arriving at 1030 hrs. Here we waited while the NSR on the right secured STRACKHOLT (9330) and the R de C secured ULBARGEN (900312) and the bridge at MITTEGROSSEPENN (890235).

The QCR responsibility was to complete the Bde plan by clearing up to OSTERSANDER 6855363 and HOLTROP (885375), the SL for 7 Bde.

At 1600 hrs the Bn began to move into the R de C area to assemble for the attack.

Bog Coy at 1815 hrs crossed thesh to begin the attack, their objective, the crossroads at 879359. Moving along the road the coy had reached the benf at 886347 when the lead platoon was pinned down by MG and MA fire from both flanks. The flat terrain afforded no cover and the coy was forced to remain in this position and attempt to neutralise the enemy by fire. A/Th fire was called to bear on probable tergets in the vicinity and several fires were started. Mortar and Arty support was called for harassing tasks while the coy dug in along the road. Three casualties were suffered.

4 May 45

, At 0100 hrs under cover of darkness Dog Coy moved from this position to continue its attack. Blown bridges and road craters were the only opposition succuntered and the objective was reached by 0200 hrs.

Baker Coy now began moving up to pass through Dog Coy at 0300 hrs and thrust West and North into OSTERSANDER. It appeares that the enemy had withdrawn, leaving only rear guards in the area, for the coy met no oppsition and were consolidated by 0600 hrs, 14 of the enemy surrendered.

In the early afternoon Charlie Coy commenced the attack toward HOLTHOP, its objective the crossroads at 873369. Despite fierce resistance from SA fire and a 20 mm AA gun the coy was on the crossroads by 1500 hrs. Three casualties were suffered while known enemy losses were one killed.

It was shortly after this that Lt-Col Harms, comd of the troops defending AURICH, accompanied by the Burgomaster, came into Charlie Coy's lines under a flag of truce to negotiate the surrender of AURICH.

While the Brigadier discussed terms with the Commandant all arms were ordered to cease fire unless anactual counter attack took place. All afternoon the Bm waited. Late in the afternoon Lt-Col Harms received instructions from his HQ to cease negotiations and it seemed that the battle was to be resumed. The real reason for this was however soon apparent. At 2000 hrs it was officially announced that the unconditional surrender of all German forces facing the 21st Army Gp, innHW Germany, Holland, the Friesian Islands, Heligoland, Denmark and all ships in the adjacent waters, had been negotiated by Field Marshal Montgomery and representatives of the German General Staff. The cease fire was to begin officially at 0800 hrs the following morning, 5 May 45.

OPERATION "PLUMBER" was complete. No greater success had ever been acheived and no happier men than the soldiers of 21 Army Op had ever fought, and won.
